Funding

- Travel expenses for CSRCs to attend this mandatory training event are to be charged to the local NC&SRC program and applied to the training portion of the 2009- 2010 NC&SRC Program grant. This includes transportation costs for one vehicle.
- All CSRCs should follow the advance travel and accommodation policies and procedures as required by their employer.
- Travel expenses to support the additional cost of steering committee members or representatives of partner agencies / organizations will be reimbursed by the Northern Sport, Culture and Recreation District. One additional vehicle will be reimbursed from each site.
- Air transportation must be preapproved for participants from communities that rely solely upon air transportation.
- Hotel accommodation to support the cost of steering committee members or C&SRC partner agencies / organizations will be reimbursed by the Northern Sport, Culture and Recreation District for up to two rooms per participating NC&SRP site. Accommodation expenses will require the submission of hotel receipts. Claim forms will be available.
- Participants will be responsible for meals while en route and the training event will provide 2 breakfasts and 2 lunches.
- **All Participants are responsible to make their own hotel reservations** according to their employer policy.
