Community Visits & Consultation


NSCRD staff manages community profiles on each of our member communities; I I from the East Service Area, 23 from the West Service Area and 19 from the Central/Far North Service area. In 2021-2022, NSCRD Community Relations Coordinators and other staff reported 82 community visits and 182 critical conference calls in and with member communities. Service activities include delivery of NSCRD programs and services, supporting and attending steering committee meetings, ongoing communication, supporting grant opportunities, program planning, and other community development activities. The Annual Report shares information on these activities throughout the year.

Rec Café

PURPOSE: To get Recreation Professionals together to support each other in their employment.

OUTCOME: To have a better understanding of the supports out there for your employment and your community; to share ideas with each other.

There were four virtual Rec Café's held:

- May 18, 2021 18 participants from 14 different communities.
- October 20, 2021 12 participants from Sucker River, Creighton, Cumberland House, Pelican Narrows, Île-à-la-Crosse, Stanley Mission, La Ronge, Canoe Lake Cree First Nation, Buffalo Narrows, Sandy Bay and Pinehouse.
- January 19, 2022 9 participants from Creighton, Stanly Mission, La Ronge, Cumberland House, Grandmothers Bay, Pinehouse, Stanley Mission, and Canoe Lake Cree First Nation.
- March 25, 2022 9 participants from Air Ronge, La Ronge, Île-à-la-Crosse, Southend, Buffalo Narrows, Denare Beach, Cole Bay, and Pelican Narrows.



Northern Community & School Recreation Coordinator Program (NC&SRCP) (2020-21 NC&SRCP Program Year)

The purpose of the Northern Community & School Recreation Coordinator Program (NC&SRCP) is to enhance the quality of life for northerners through the provision of community-based sport, culture and recreation programs, after school, in the evenings, on weekends and at community and school special events. The program is delivered in partnership with Northern municipalities, First Nations, community sport, culture and recreation organizations, education divisions/ authorities and the Northern Sport, Culture & Recreation District.

Financial

The NC&SRCP is funded by the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund. The program runs on a school-year calendar from September 1 to August 31 annually.

The NC&SRCP community site grant for the 2020-21 program year was \$54,900 for full time sites. The Northern Lights School Division #113 contributed an additional \$7,000 for full time sites and \$3,500 for a half time site to support increased programming and training expenses in all sites where they are the employer.

The NC&SRCP grant is designed to support the following elements in a community program:

Local Employment of a Community & School Recreation Coordinator

CSRCs are hired by a local employer based on a combination of education, community knowledge, related experience, strengths, and other certifications. Average full time CSRC Salary and Benefits was \$47,008.

Training and Professional Development

A variety of training opportunities are offered throughout the year. CSRCs are also encouraged to seek out professional development opportunities to enhance their ability to offer high quality programs. Average site expense on training opportunities for CSRC was \$820.

Program Supplies and Leadership

The remaining portion of the grant (after wages and training) is available for expense on programming supplies. Average site expense on program supplies and leadership was \$12,373.

Training

Training opportunities are facilitated by the NSCRD each year. These events are designed to meet the training needs of CSRCs and to build capacity of steering committees and community partners in participating communities. Adaptations had to be made this year due to COVID-19.

Play Leadership provides learners with the knowledge and skills required to plan and coordinate safe, accessible, and enjoyable play opportunities for children.

Topics covered during the course include managing risk and behavior, promoting inclusive environments for diversity, planning for activities and events, understanding all types of play, and identifying a Circle of Support.



Program Planning & Participation

To guide the development of programs, all sites are required to submit an Annual Program Plan and Statistics (APPS) using the online APPS tool developed by the NSCRD.

The data collected from the APPS tool is summarized from participation data from each site. It helps establish a basic understanding of the sport, culture and recreation opportunities provided in program communities.

A total of 85,925 participation opportunities occurred through 3,736 program sessions (average 173 sessions per site).

3355 unique participants in regular ongoing after-school programs.

733 leaders and volunteers involved in the facilitation of programs.

48% of programs planned were recreation in scope

18% of programs planned were sport in scope

31% of programs planned were culture in scope

4% of programs planned were leadership in scope

8% of participants were pre-school (0-4yrs) age

26% of participants were children (5-12yrs) age

25% of participants were youth (13-18yrs) age

29% of participants were adult (19-49yrs) age

11% of participants were elder (50+yrs) age

100% of programs reduced barriers in design by providing food; transportation; or no cost

1129 programs planned; 660 programs facilitated

Impact of COVID-19 on Programming

The Pandemic changed the parameters in which most CSRCs were used to programming, including:

- Moving programs outdoors
- Take home packages
- Small numbers/focus groups
- Social distance requirements
- Virtual facilitation
- PPE/Sanitation
- Spending on program supplies
- Importance of registration
- Allowing for transition time between groups

SMART GOALS

In the absence of in person planning, NSCRD Staff and CSRCs collectively develop monthly SMART GOALS which CSRCs aimed to achieve each month. The need for a shorter term, flexible and achievable success (vs. long term planning) was critical to adapting to the ever-changing restrictions brought on by COVID-19.

S-specific, M-measurable, A-achievable, R-realistic, T-timely

Program Quality - HIGH FIVE®

HIGH FIVE® is Canada's only quality standard for organizations providing recreation and sport programs to children aged 6 to 12. Through a quality assurance process, HIGH FIVE® supports the safety, well-being, and healthy development of children.

The QUEST 2 assessment is utilized to review, measure, and evaluate the extent to which children's programs support healthy development and quality of programs provided.

CSRCs scored 92% in 33 overall HIGH FIVE QUEST 2 program assessment scores.

Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund Community Grant Program

Purpose

The Sask Lotteries Community Grant Program is a partnership among Sask Sport Inc., SaskCulture Inc. and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association Inc. The grant program assists in the development of sport, culture and recreation programs by providing funds to non-profit community organizations operated by volunteers.

This year 54 of 56 communities applied for 114 different projects, 75% of the projects targeted participation for all community members. Other program focus included 23 youth programs, 5 programs for seniors, 1 unique program 'artifact hunting' Cumberland House and at least 20 traditional culture and/or land-based programs.


Indigenous Community Sport Development Workbook and Grant Program



The ICSDG Workbook and Grant Program is a Sask Sport funding initiative targeted at developing community-based sport programs to launch them into competitive venues, club formation, association with a Provincial Sport Governing Body, and developing their athletes and coaches so they can effectively compete and train. In the last financial year, the adjudication committee approved 17 applications from 13 different northern communities.

The ICSD Workbook and Grant Program has facilitated communities to develop sport programs through:

- Funding for equipment purchases.
- Supporting travel for competition and development training for athlete, coach and officials.
- Recognition for volunteers.
- Fees to join provincial sport governing bodies and competition registration.

Athlete, Coach & Officials Development

NSCRD's athlete, coach, and official's development initiatives in partnership with the National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP), provincial sport governing bodies, Indigenous Coaches and Officials Program, and with regional partners like NLSD#113. Strategies focus on the long-term development of sports of high interest and participation in community and school-based clubs. Types of coaching development opportunities include:

- NCCP Community Stream coaching courses
- NCCP Introduction to Competition Multi-Sport Modules Part A & B, Making Ethical Decisions, Fundamental Movement Skills
- NCCP Introduction to Competition Sport Specific
- NCCP Level One Officials Training Sport Specific
- Sport specific training camps have been held in the northern District

Sport Pillar - Athlete Development

NSCRD provided 6 athlete development camps in the sports of basketball, lacrosse, and canoe. Three-hundred youth attended the 6 various camps. The largest was the far north camp tour in basketball serving over 200 youth.

Sport Pillar - Coaching Development

The NSCRD, in partnership with the Coaching Association of Saskatchewan, Indigenous Coaches and Officials Program and our Provincial Sport Governing Bodies, supported 12 coaching sport clinics in the sports of: football, hockey, curling, lacrosse, cross-country ski, archery, and canoe. Additionally, 11 online coaching modules and workshops supported 90 member coaches.



Sport Pillar - Officiating Development

The NSCRD, in partnership with the Coaching Association of Saskatchewan, Indigenous Coaches and Officials Program and our Provincial Sport Governing Bodies, supported 3 officials' clinics in the sports of hockey, basketball and volleyball, training 60 new officials.

National Indigenous History Month


In June, Canadians celebrate National Indigenous History Month to honour the history, heritage, and diversity of Indigenous peoples in Canada. The celebration is an opportunity to recognize the strength of present-day Indigenous communities.

The Northern Sport, Culture and Recreation District, celebrates the diverse and rich history of the Indigenous groups that have lived in Northern Saskatchewan since time immemorial. In partnership with MBC, the NSCRD is profiling Indigenous recreation leaders as part of National Indigenous History Month.











Arts and Culture Leaders Registry

The Arts & Culture Leader Registry is a contemporary alternative for the Northern Arts & Culture Handbook. The purpose is to celebrate northern arts and culture; highlight northern talent; and to provide opportunity for arts and culture leaders through:

- Promotion on social media, website, and newsletter distribution.
- Build individual and organizational capacity.
- Connection of registered arts and culture leaders to relevant provincial and national programs and services.

Northern Youth Cultural Fund

The Northern Youth Cultural Fund (NYCF) in partnership with SK Culture provides funding for cultural, artistic, or creative interactive activities for children and youth up to age 19 in northern Saskatchewan.

The Northern Youth Cultural Fund aims to:

- Connect children and youth to unique, life-changing artistic and cultural experiences in their communities.
- Provide all children and youth with the opportunity to participate in creative activities regardless of economic barriers they may face.
- Provide financial support so all kids have an opportunity to participate in creative activities like drama, art, dance, culture, and music; and
- Support cultural programming, which is critical to a healthy, vibrant community.

Ski Fit North (SFN) Family Fun Ski Day

The Northern Sport, Culture and Recreation District (NSCRD) in collaboration with Cross-Country Saskatchewan has dedicated funding for the development of community based Cross-Country Skiing within the NSCRD boundary. Establishing a Cross-Country Ski Club in Northern Saskatchewan can be challenging, we believe by providing an opportunity for volunteers to become certified coaches that we can work towards

establishing community based Cross-Country Skiing in our Northern communities. This grant is to assist communities with the development of establishing their Cross-Country Ski coaches and volunteers and building their community Ski Club by hosting their very own Family Fun Ski Day in their home community after attending the coaching certification course.



There were 11 participants from Stony Rapids, two schools in Deschambault Lake, Weyakwin, Beauval, Cumberland House and English River/Patuanak who obtained their certification in Cross-Country Ski coaching, received a community start up kit for the Cross-Country ski club and began a Family Fun Ski Day in their communities.



Community Book Program

In March boxes of 150 books for youth ages 5-16 were distributed to 26 communities, supporting approximately 3900 families and youth. The books were purchased from McNally Robinson. Distribution occurred as a part of virtual programs and activity-packages facilitated by Northern Community & School Recreation Coordinators and key community contacts. The objective of the program was to enhance family connection and provide a resource that supported family-led recreation and cultural programming.

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


