
Our Mission

Geographical Representation

The five (5) geographic areas located within the District, comprised of Northern Municipalities and First Nations communities from which our General Board Members are elected.

Our Role

The most important role that we have as a District is to assist northern communities with their sport, culture and recreation development. All the staff at the NSCRD are available to support community needs in the sport, culture, recreation, physical activity or youth leadership areas. We are here to help connect communities with other organizations such as provincial sport governing bodies, recreational and/or cultural organizations. Community Visits & Consultation

NSCRD staff manage community profiles on each of our 54 member communities. In 2024-2025, NSCRD staff reported 83 community visits and 83 critical conference calls in and with NSCRD members. Service activities include delivery of NSCRD programs and services, supporting and attending steering committee meetings, ongoing communication, supporting grant opportunities, program planning, and other community development activities. The Annual Report shares information on these activities throughout the year.

Tools to Support Community Development

The NSCRD develops "tools" like the Community Recreation Handbook to assist member communities. Listed below are some examples of facilitated workshops:

Global Partnership







NSCRD with our global partners; Sask Culture, SPRA, and Sask Sport, hosted regular Zoom meetings, program initiatives, provincial clinics, training opportunities and program planning building community development.

Grant Writing Workshop

NSCRD staff are here to collaborate with individuals applying for sport, culture, and recreation grants to review and provide support to achieve successful outcomes. Upon request, where there is an increased interest, NSCRD will facilitate grant writing workshops.

Two (2) grant writing workshops virtually facilitated:

- December 10, 2024, hosted a virtual grant writing workshop, four (4) members registered from La Loche/Clearwater River Dene Nation, Montreal Lake/Prince Albert, Meadow Lake and Saskatoon.
- March 19, 2025, hosted a second virtual workshop, sixteen (16) registered from eleven (11) communities. Buffalo Narrows, Canoe Lake, Turnor Lake, La Loche, La Ronge, Île-à-la-Crosse, Southend, Beauval, Sandy Bay, Cole Bay, and Prince Albert.

Rec Café

PURPOSE: To get Recreation Professionals together to support each other in their employment.

OUTCOME: To have a better understanding of the supports out there for your employment and your community; to share ideas with each other.

There were five (5) virtual Rec Café's held:

- September 12, 2024 Focus on Grants, with guest speakers from Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association (SPRA), Communities Initiatives Fund (CIF) and Sask Culture. Twenty-four (24) registered from eleven (11) communities. (Pinehouse, Creighton, La Ronge, Air Ronge, Lac La Ronge Indian Band, Cole Bay, Beauval, Turnor Lake, La Loche, Wollaston Lake, Southend).
- January 28, 2025 Workplace Generational Divide: Overcoming Barriers, seventeen (17) registered from six (6) communities and ten (10) organizations.
- January 30, 2025 Running Effective Meetings: Rules, Procedures and Building Chairperson Skills, seventeen (17) registered from four (4) communities and five (5) organizations.
- February 4, 2025 Fundamentals of Finance: Best Practices in Building Financial Literacy, seventeen (17) registered from four (4) communities and eight (8) organizations.
- February 6, 2025 Making the Most of your Schedule: Fundamentals of Time Management, twenty (20) registered from four (4) communities and six (6) organizations.





Northern Community & School Recreation Coordinator Program (NC&SRCP) (2023-24 NC&SRCP Program Year)

The purpose of the Northern Community & School Recreation Coordinator Program (NC&SRCP) is to enhance the quality of life for northerners through the provision of community-based sport, culture and recreation programs after school, in the evenings, on weekends and at community and school special events.

Community and School Recreation Coordinators (CSRCs) are employed to facilitate the delivery of sport, culture and recreation programs, using the school as a major asset of the community and in partnership with other community-based organizations providing sport, culture and recreation programs, services and facilities.

Funded by the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund.

Financial

The NC&SRCP is funded by the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund. The program runs on a school-year calendar from September 1 to August 31 annually.

Community Site Grant

The NC&SRCP grant is designed to support the following elements in a community program:

Local Employment of a CSRC

CSRCs are hired by a local employer based on a combination of education, community knowledge, related experience, strengths, and other certifications. Average full time CSRC salary and benefits and employment remittance was \$40,721.45.

Training and Professional Development

A variety of training opportunities are offered throughout the year. CSRCs are also encouraged to seek out professional development opportunities to enhance their ability to offer high quality programs. Average site expense on training opportunities for CSRC was \$3,298.53.

Program Supplies and Leadership

The remaining portion of the grant (after wages and training) is available for expense on programming supplies. Average site expense on program supplies and leadership was \$12,832.16.

Leadership Training

NSCRD hosts a variety of training opportunities for CSRCs and Community Partners throughout the year.

Archery Training

February, La Ronge – ten (10) CSRCs, one (1) community member. NASP led training event to allow CSRCs to teach Archery in schools.

Pickleball Training

August, La Ronge - ten (10) CSRCs.

Pickleball training in La Ronge taught the rules of the game and the basics of how to play. All attending CSRCs left with a Pickleball set including a net, balls, and rackets.

Fifteen (15) Facilitated Calls

Topics included: Calendar Creation, Astronomy Programming, Christmas Fun, Roundtables, CSRC Jeopardy, Getting Out of Your Comfort Zone, Book Programming, Summer Program Planning, and Setting S.M.A.R.T. goals.

Fitness 2|2

Through a partnership with Fitness 2J2, the NSCRD collaborated with the communities of PBCN Deschambault Lake, Pinehouse Lake, LLRIB Kitsaki (Senator Myles Venne School), English River First Nation (Dillon) and PBCN Pelican Narrows. Fitness 2J2 provided all-encompassing fitness programming and leadership to school aged children during the day and then adults and elders into the evening. Activities included self-defense training, yoga instruction and basic fitness.

Program Planning & Participation

To guide the development of programs, all sites are required to submit an Annual Program Plan and Statistics (APPS) using the online APPS tool developed by the NSCRD.

The data collected from the APPS tool is summarized from participation data from each site. It helps establish a basic understanding of the sport, culture and recreation opportunities provided in program communities.

A total of 88,481 participation opportunities occurred during 5,581 program sessions (average 260 sessions per site).

- 4,058 unique participants in regular ongoing after-school programs.
- 46% of programs planned were recreation in scope.
- 23% of programs planned were sport in scope.
- 26% of programs planned were culture in scope.
- 5% of programs planned were leadership in scope.
- 6% of participants were pre-school (0-4yrs) age.
- 29% of participants were children (5-12yrs) age.
- 35% of participants were youth (13-18yrs) age.
- 26% of participants were adult (19-49yrs) age.
- 4% of participants were elder (50+yrs) age.
- 100% of programs reduced barriers in design by providing food, transportation or no cost.
- 1255 programs planned and 848 programs facilitated.

Enhancing Existing Sites

Many community sites find themselves able to go above and beyond the existing funding and program using additional dollars to enhance the experience in their sites. To help them out with that, we provided the Enhancement grant which provided five (5) separate communities with extra dollars to run additional programming that the core site grant was not able to provide.

Examples of community program successes utilizing the Enhancement Grant:

- Buffalo Narrows Canning Day, as well as additional summer programming.
- Green Lake Holidays Week, Christmas to Valentines Day ran in one week during the summer!
- Île-à-la-Crosse Fishing and Soccer.
- English River First Nation Fishing, Canada Day and Beach Days.
- Sandy Bay Boating, Camping and Canada Day.

Summer Program Tour

Community Developer Shelly Panko-Schultz with NSCRD staff, were able to provide one-to-one mentorship to specific sites to allow CSRCs to learn, grow and develop skills needed to transform their Annual Program Plan into the day-to-day business of their job. Communities visited by Shelly include Cumberland House Cree Nation, PBCN Deschambault Lake, LLRIB Kitsaki (Senator Myles Venne School), LLRIB Stanley Mission, PBCN Southend, Green Lake and Buffalo Narrows.

Book Program

In partnership with McNally Robinson, the NSCRD provided 100 books to each program site. These books were intended for all ages. This allowed CSRCs to lead book-based programming such as reading clubs, elders reading time, and virtual reading groups.

Program Quality - HIGH FIVE®

The NSCRD and NC&SCRP continue to



utilize HIGH FIVE® to ensure a standard when evaluating programs. HIGH FIVE® training allows CSRCs to enhance their knowledge on how to lead Children's programming to the best of their ability.

Program Strengths Include:

- Leader Behaviour Interactions;
 Discretion with Confidential Matters
- Child To Child Interaction; Atmosphere
- Program Characteristics; Welcoming Environment

A high score in HIGH FIVE® Leader Behaviour Interactions, indicates that CSRCs focus attention on children and not one another, use appropriate language and behaviour and work as a team.

The Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund Community Grant Program

The Sask Lotteries Community Grant Program is a partnership among Sask Sport Inc., SaskCulture Inc. and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association Inc. The grant program assists in the development of sport, culture and recreation programs by providing funds to non-profit community organizations operated by volunteers.

In 2024-25, forty-seven communities applied for 116 different projects opportunities. Opportunity providing programming for the entire community, Canada Day and Treaty Day events and others providing direct planning for specific target groups, elders yoga and youth craft nights.

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Indigenous Community Sport Development Workbook and Grant Program (ICSDG)



The Indigenous Community Sport Grant is a Sask Sport funding initiative targeted at developing community-based sport programs to launch them into competitive venues, club formation, association with a Provincial Sport Governing Body, and developing their athletes and coaches so they can effectively compete and train.

In the last financial year, the adjudication committee has approved thirty-three (33) applications.

- Funding for equipment purchases.
- Supporting travel for competition and development training for athlete, coach and officials.
- Recognition for volunteers.
- Fees to join provincial sport governing bodies and competition registration.

Athlete, Coach & Officials Development

NSCRD athlete, coach, and official's development initiatives in partnership with the National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP), provincial sport governing bodies, Indigenous Coaches and Officials Program, and with regional partners like NLSD#113. Strategies focus on the long-term development of sports of high interest and participation in community and school-based clubs. Types of coaching development opportunities include:

- NCCP Community Stream coaching courses.
- NCCP Introduction to Competition Multi-Sport Modules Part A & B, Making Ethical Decisions, Fundamental Movement Skills.
- NCCP Introduction to Competition Sport Specific.
- NCCP Level One Officials Training Sport Specific.
- Sport specific training camps have been held in the Northern District.

Sport Pillar - Athlete Development

NSCRD provided athlete development camps in the sports of soccer (fourteen (14) opportunities), canoeing (twelve (12) events), cross country skiing (twelve (12) events), pickleball, Smashball, Kin-Ball, football, girls hockey, minor hockey (four (4) events), and Future Stars Program. Over six hundred and thirty-five (635) youth attended the 47 various sport camp opportunities held in the north from over 25 communities.

Sport Pillar - Coaching Development

The NSCRD, in partnership with the Coaching Association of Saskatchewan, the Indigenous Coaches and Officials Program and our Provincial Sport Governing Bodies, supported coaching clinics in the sports of pickleball, two (2) broomball clinics, cross country skiing, three (3) canoe, and five (5) Aboriginal Coaches Modules. Twelve (12) coaching opportunities and seven (7) online workshops instructed 153 certified or new coaches/instructors.

Sport Pillar - Officiating Development

The NSCRD, in partnership with the Coaching Association of Saskatchewan, the Indigenous Coaches and Officials Program and our Provincial Sport Governing Bodies, supported three (3) officials' clinics in the sports of soccer, volleyball and broomball, training 33 new officials, fifteen (15) of them being youth.

Northern Hockey Development

NSCRD partnered with the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey (SJHL) teams La Ronge Ice Wolves and Flin Flon Bombers to host hockey development camps for the communities of Weyakwin, Stanley Mission, Pinehouse and Deschambault Lake. One hundred and four (104) participants in the four (4) camps.





Saskatchewan Summer Games

Team North represented nine (9) sport teams at the 2024 Saskatchewan Summer Games in Lloydminster. Sixty-five (65) athletes, ten (10) coaches, eleven (11) managers, and five (5) mission staff attended.

In the sports of:

Golf – one (1) male athlete and two (2) managers.

Soccer (F) – fifteen (15) female athletes, two (2) coaches and one (1) manager.

Volleyball (F) – eight (8) female athletes, one (1) coach and one (1) manager.

Special 'O' Bocce – athletes, one (1) male, two (2) female, one (1) coach and one (1) manager.

Canoe/Kayak – six (6) male and six (6) female athletes, two coaches and one manager.

Triathlon – three (3) female athletes, one (1) coach and one (1) manager.

Beach Volleyball – two (2) male athletes, one (1) coach and one (1) manager.

Athletics – three (3) male and two (2) female athletes, and two (2) managers.

Soccer (M) – sixteen (16) male athletes, two (2) coaches and one (1) manager.

Medals

Gold - Four (4) in Canoe/Kayak.

Silver - Eleven (11) Medals, one (1) Golf and ten (10) Canoe/Kayak.

Bronze – Five (5) Medals, one (1) Athletics Discus and four (4) Canoe/Kayak.







Culture Days

Within the northern district three (3) member communities registered for Culture Days (Creighton/Flin Flon, La Ronge, Buffalo Narrows). Projects include: La Ronge Library- Community Art Project and Talent Show, Town of La Ronge Recreation - fiddle event, Buffalo Narrows Recreation- ribbon skirt making. Creighton/Flin Flon area had 45 projects during culture days including theatre, dance, beading, soapstone carving, birch bark biting, arts, main street days and much more.

National Indigenous History Month

In June, Canadians celebrate National Indigenous History Month to honour the history, heritage, and diversity of Indigenous peoples in Canada. It is also an opportunity to recognize the strength of present-day Indigenous communities.

The Northern Sport, Culture and Recreation District, celebrates the diverse and rich history of the Indigenous groups that have lived in Northern Saskatchewan since time immemorial. In partnership with MBC Radio, the NSCRD is profiling Indigenous VOLUNTEER leaders as part of National Indigenous History Month.

Arts and Culture Leaders

The Arts & Culture Leader Registry is a contemporary alternative for the Northern Arts & Culture Handbook. The purpose is to celebrate northern arts and culture; highlight northern talent; and to provide opportunity for arts and culture leaders through:

- Promotion on social media, website, and newsletter distribution.
- Build individual and organizational capacity.
- Connection of registered arts and culture leaders to relevant provincial and national programs and services.

In support of arts and cultural leaders, NSCRD partnered with the Lac La Ronge Indian Band by providing sponsorship to the Tony Cote Summer Games Cultural Village. The Lac La Ronge Indian Band Cultural Village being the first cultural village hosted during a Tony Cote Games, provided 44 traditional knowledge keepers, artist, and crafts people opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and talents. Beading, birchbark biting, carving demonstrations, Cree language, fish preparation, skiff making, square dancing, snowshoe making, tipi teachings, traditional medicine teas and traditional medicine teaching land and water, wild fur teaching, hide tanning and net making were included in the pavilions throughout the event for attendees from across the province to engage in.







Northern Youth Cultural Fund

The Northern Youth Cultural Fund (NYCF) in partnership with SK Culture provides funding for cultural, artistic, or creative interactive activities for children and youth up to age 19 in northern Saskatchewan.

The Northern Youth Cultural Fund aims to:

- Connect children and youth to unique, life-changing artistic and cultural experiences in their communities.
- Provide all children and youth with the opportunity to participate in creative activities regardless of economic barriers they may face.
- Provide financial support so all kids have an opportunity to participate in creative activities like drama, art, dance, culture, and music; and.

Hip Hop Workshops in the Far North

NSCRD in partnership with Hip Hop artist mentors- ZHE the Free, Big Tones, and B-boy Karlo provided culturally responsive programs the communities of Fond du Lac, Wollaston Lake, Black Lake and Stony Rapids. They also provided Hip Hop enhancements in Buffalo Narrows, Canoe Lake and Beauval. More than 700 youth participated in interactive Hip Hop, beat making, R.A.P, freestyle and performance skills. After school sessions gave youth opportunity to create their own recording to listen to and have.





Community Volunteer Celebration

NSCRD provided a unique opportunity to celebrate northern volunteer leaders. A nomination process opened for community members to nominate volunteer leaders in their community by telling us who they are and what impact they make in the community. Three opportunities granted in the categories of sport, culture, and recreation recognizing eleven (11) volunteers, one (1) club, and two (2) programs, in three (3) communities (Île-à-la-Crosse, La Ronge, and LLRIB Kitsaki), supporting eighteen (18) youth hockey players, multiple youth dance club members and family survivors of suicide.

All volunteers received a token of appreciation.







RECREATION

Spirit North

NSCRD collaborated with Spirit North and Cross Country Saskatchewan to bring a traveling cross-country skiing program to Northern Saskatchewan. Ten (10) communities visited (La Ronge, Air Ronge, LLRIB – Kitsaki, Hall Lake, Sucker River, and Stanley Mission, PBCN Southend, La Loche, Île-à-la-Crosse, and Cumberland House). Community Program Leaders visited twelve (12) agencies, with an overall of 768 participants over 53 days of programming. Two (2) community events attended (Saskaloppet and School Ski Championships) with 171 participants; Spirit North collaborated with those participants/communities to get them to the two community events.

School Ski Championships

NSCRD in partnership with the La Ronge Nordic Ski Club to host the School Ski Championships. A total of 126 skiers participated, from Churchill Community High School, Gordon Denny Community School, Pre-Cam Community School, Sally Ross School, Rossignol Community School, and the communities of Flin Flon, Hudson Bay, Saskatoon, and Regina.



Ball Diamond Maintenance Course

NSCRD held a Ball Diamond Maintenance course in the Northern Village of Air Ronge on Tuesday, May 28, 2024. Sixteen (16) participants registered from five (5) communities (La Ronge, Beauval, LLRIB Kitsaki, La Loche and Air Ronge). Ten (10) participants attended the one-day course.

Communities in Bloom

To inspire all communities to enhance the quality of life and our environment through people and plants to create community pride. The Northern District has two (2) communities registered as 'CinB' Communities (Île-à-la-Crosse and Creighton). NSCRD assists these communities with their local committees.

NPIDF (Northern Physical Instructor Development Fund)

The intention of the Northern Physical Instructor Development Fund (NPIDF) is to support Community Development by disbursing funds to Municipalities, Metis Locals, First Nations, and Schools that deliver physical fitness programs.

This funding will build and/or enhance community capacity by developing physical fitness instructors in Northern communities in Saskatchewan.

A guiding principle of this Northern Physical Instructor Development Fund is that communities are empowered and supported to assess for themselves the training and development they most need.

NSCRD approved four (4) applicants to obtain physical fitness certifications to become leaders. One (1) applicant has completed their Children's

Fitness Coach Certificate, and three (3) applicants completed their Cross Fit Level 1 certification. Meanwhile, one (1) applicant has approval to obtain their National Lifeguard and Instructor Training in the upcoming year.



NSCRD assisted two (2) individuals to attend the Assistant Curling Ice Technician course in La Ronge. These two individuals represented the community of La Ronge from the Lac La Ronge Curling Club. Meanwhile six (6) attended the course held at the La Ronge Curling Club.

Play Leadership

NSCRD, in partnership with SPRA, delivered one (1) SPRA Play Leader workshop. Thirteen (13) participants registered from twelve (12) communities (La Ronge, LLRIB - Kitsaki, Sucker River, and Stanley Mission, PBCN Southend and Deschambault Lake, Cumberland House, Patuanak, Canoe Lake Cree Nation, Timber Bay, Buffalo Narrows, and Dillon).

Listen to Dis' (LTD) - A Performance & Disability Cultural Conversation

Listen to Dis' is Saskatchewan's first and only disability-led, disability arts organization. NSCRD partnered with LTD to perform in northern Saskatchewan. Stanley Mission – May 3, 2024 – held at the Rhoda Hardlotte Memorial Keethanow High School with 260 attending.

The event opened with a dazzling montage of music and theatre from past and future productions performed by LTD's music ensemble The Dripping Honeys and guest artists. Our goal was to invite people in, through art and facilitated dialogue, to create a better understanding of access and inclusion from a Crip perspective. One that helps construct community awareness and appreciation of disability and access in art,



culture, and education. It was unapologetically satirical, ironic, and hilarious and was meant to interrupt hidden biases around disability.

Following the performance, we host a safe and nurturing community conversation about ACCESS and the ARTS: The how, why, when, where, and who... We, as always, MOVE at the SPEED OF TRUST.

Understand Diversity Webinar

NSCRD partnered with other Districts to deliver an Understand Diversity webinar with facilitator Flo Frank. There were six (6) northerners attending, representing five (5) communities (Pinehouse, Air Ronge, Creighton, La Ronge and LLRIB Kitsaki).
