Sask Lotteries

In its 2022-23 fiscal year, Sask Lotteries celebrated dozens of major wins across the province. Thirteen millionaires were celebrated, including a \$1 million win by a group of 52 individuals, which was the largest group win for a prize over \$1 million in the Prairies.

Lottery sales increased in 2022-23 over the previous fiscal year — a result that is made possible through Sask Lotteries' retail partners who play a critical role in supporting the Sask Lotteries fundraiser and its products. In the past year, the LOTTO 6/49 Gold Ball was launched and now offers larger jackpots more frequently.

Additional product enhancements are expected in the next year to further strengthen the Sask Lotteries fundraiser and the proceeds that are available to support sport, culture and recreation organizations.

Tri-Globally Supported Programs

Sask Sport, SaskCulture and SPRA work collaboratively to support key initiatives and programs that benefit the sport, culture and recreation system and people and communities within Saskatchewan. The initiatives supported include the Sask Lotteries Community Grant Program, the Dream Broker Program and the Northern Community and School Recreation Coordinator Program.

Dream Brokers Program

The Dream Brokers program is dedicated to sustaining the involvement and participation of children and youth in new and existing sports, culture and recreation activities and programs. The program employs 11 staff in partnership with 19 select public and catholic schools in Prince Albert, Saskatoon, Regina, Yorkton and North Battleford.

The Dream Brokers program is participant driven. Dream Brokers work directly within the schools and connect children to available programming through equipment, transportation and registration support. Dream Brokers work one-on-one with kids and their families to give them the best opportunity to succeed and try a wide variety of enriching sport, culture and recreation activities.

SASK SPORT UPDATE

Multi-sport Games

Tony Cote Winter Games were held in Saskatoon in April 2023 on behalf of James Smith Cree Nation and hosted approximately 4000 athletes and coaches and officials. Athletes competed in six sport events such as Volleyball, Basketball, Hockey, Curling, Badminton and Table Tennis. Traditional Hand Games was also a part of the athlete's village. There was a variety of Indigenous cultural events that took place over the course of the week.

The **Saskatchewan Winter Games** were held in Regina from February 19- 25, 2023. District teams participated in 16 sports over the seven-day competition. Team Saskatoon led the standings in medal counts followed by Team Regina, with Team Prairie Central rounding out the podium. With this year being the 50 anniversary of the games there was a lot to celebrate. A total of 173 communities across Saskatchewan were represented at the games with 1,015 athletes, 346 coaches, managers and mission staff and 122 technical officials coming together to celebrate sport.

The 2023 **Canada Winter Games** took place in Prince Edward Island from February 18 - March 5, 2023. Team Sask was represented in 20 sports which featured 217 athletes, 74 members of coaching staff and 27 mission staff from 60 Saskatchewan communities.

The next multi-sport games event will take place in Halifax from July 15-24, 2023. Over 550 Saskatchewan athletes, coaches, mission staff and officials will make the trip to represent Team Saskatchewan at the **North American Indigenous Games** in a total of 14 sports. The Games will feature plenty of webcast coverage of the nine days of competition and events. More information and access to webcast of the games can be found at naig2023.com

Tribal Council and First Nations Coordinators Program

There are 13 Tribal Councils that receive support through the Tribal Council Coordinators Program. The Coordinators actively work with other delivery partners to facilitate relationships, build capacity and increase access to sport, culture and recreation programming. The program is also in place to support team development for the Tony Cote Summer and Winter Games — annually supporting the participation of approximately 4,000 athletes, coaches and volunteers.

Indigenous Community Sport Development Grant

The Indigenous Community Sport Development Grant continues to be accessed by communities across the province to begin and enhance sport programming. The grant is once again available this year and is open for applications. This program has been used to support increased participation in Hockey, Volleyball, Soccer, Weightlifting, Athletics, Softball, Golf, Basketball, Baseball and more. Coaches Association of Saskatchewan

The Coaches Association of Saskatchewan (CAS) is supporting the ongoing development of Saskatchewan coaches. In Fall 2022 CAS made the decision to deliver all National Coaching Certification Programs (NCCP) through online platforms. The CAS Board of Directors passed a motion to offer free NCCP courses to all CAS member coaches from January 1, 2023, to March 31, 2023. The promotional offering supported 174 coaches with their coach development.

At the start of the year CAS secured funding from the Coaching Association of Canada through a partnership with the Public Health Agency of Canada to deliver the 'Mental Health is our Sport' Project. The aim of the project is to deliver four NCCP modules that have recently received updates that include content specific to mental health to various underrepresented or geographically isolated populations throughout the province. After consultation with Randi Keshane, Indigenous Coach and Officials Program Coordinator, CAS decided to use this funding to support delivery of coach education workshops in Indigenous and remote communities in Saskatchewan. Nick Baker, Executive Director of CAS said "I think the Mental Health is our Sport Project has provided us with a unique opportunity to return to in-person delivery and work towards ensuring every coach in our province is able to receive quality coach education opportunities."

SaskCulture Staff Changes

SaskCulture has had numerous changes to our staff roles and compliment in 2023. With the addition of new staff as well as job changes to existing staff, SaskCulture has added capacity to better support communities in Saskatchewan. These include:

- Shelley Fayant is now lead Outreach Consultant on the project funding programs: the Aboriginal Arts and Culture Leadership grant, the Multicultural Initiatives Project Fund and co-lead on the Small Grants Accessibility Grant. Shelley has moved from Communications Consultant at SaskCulture and has joined the program team.
- Tara-Leigh Heslip is now lead on the Museum Grant Program, Community Cultural Engagement and Planning Grant and co-lead on the Small Grants Accessibility Grant. Tara joins us from her previous role as Community Consultant at the South East Sport Culture and Recreation District.
- Lorelie Deroose has taken on a new position at SaskCulture. Her role has changed from Grants Administrator to Granting and Evaluation Coordinator.
- Abiodun Oyelami has joined our team as Grants Administrator, moving from his previous position at the Saskatchewan Association of International Languages.
- Busayo Osobade is our new Communications Consultant and lead consultant for Culture Days, taking over from Shelley's previous role.
- Jackie Lay has accepted full-time employment with SaskCulture and is now the Communication Coordinator.
- Dennis Garreck, 21-year veteran SaskCulture staffer, will be leaving SaskCulture at the end of June 2023 as he heads into retirement. An opportunity to celebrate Dennis will take place at our Annual General Meeting this year.

NEW INITIATIVES:

Funding Program Renewal Project

SaskCulture is currently engaged in a Funding Program Renewal Project in order to:

- Ensure that its funding model is sustainable, accessible and adaptive to changing needs in order to support relevant cultural programming and services in Saskatchewan.
- Ensure that funding is supporting cultural programs, activities and experiences that are more inclusive, diverse, equitable and accessible (IDEA).

The Funding Program Renewal Project will take place in phases over the next few years. SaskCulture will provide stakeholders with opportunities to provide input and get involved with the process, as well as keeping the community up to date on the project as it progresses: saskculture.ca/programs/funding-program-renewal-project

Small Grants Accessibility Program

This program aims to provide support to grassroots, unique and innovative cultural activities. This fund has an ongoing intake from June 1 to August 31, 2023. Planned activities must occur four weeks after application submission.

The Small Grants Accessibility Program objectives are to:

- Support new or underserved organizations that have never been awarded a SaskCulture grant.
- Support grassroots, unique and innovative cultural initiatives.
- Respond to emergent needs, time-sensitive opportunities or changes in the cultural sector.

- Encourage youth-led cultural initiatives and leadership opportunities for young cultural leaders.
- Support and strengthen communities through cultural activities in Saskatchewan, at the individual, group and community level.
- Support the development and capacity of cultural organizations through professional development courses.

Shared Delivery

SaskCulture and partners continue to build on the success of the last year's inaugural launch of a shared delivery partnership approach to funding. The Gabriel Dumont Institute leads as the primary consultant with the Métis Cultural Development Fund and the Northern Sport Culture and Recreation District leads as primary consultant for the Northern Youth Cultural Fund. (Both programs are listed on our grants page). SaskCulture staff continue to support both partners through grant administration and through the online grant platform.

Share and Connect

For two years, SK Arts and SaskCulture have partnered on a consultative approach with Elders, Knowledge Keepers and artists, which culminated into the creation of the [Share and Connect: Indigenous Community Arts](#) - launched in the fall of 2022.

Share and Connect Indigenous Community Arts engaged community leaders to inform and contribute to a process that resulted in a program that seeks to support development opportunities for individual Indigenous artists, collaborations between artists and community and mentorship opportunities for established artists to engage with emerging and young talent. The next deadlines for submissions are June 7 and January 7.

In addition to the creation of the *Share and Connect: Indigenous Community Arts* program, the process laid foundations for the partnership to expand. In early 2023, the Multicultural Council of Saskatchewan, SK Arts and SaskCulture formed a partnership that engages underserved equity deserving ethno artists from primarily Black Person and Person of Colour and newcomer communities in Saskatchewan. Consultations are underway with community contributors. A new program/resulting initiative will be promoted later this year.
